This replaced the traditional Rural Grunch, which we had published and printed since March 2009.

We made the decision to go online following the Covid 19 Lockdown that came into effect on 23rd March 2020.

After Covid 19, the UK has suffered a costof-living crisis and it is safe to say we would not have been able to continue the magazine in its traditional form due to the increase in prices for paper and print.

As indicated in its title, we are able to update the online magazine on a daily basis and we do this 300 times a year.

This allows us to give coverage of local community events almost immediately after they have taken place rather than wait up to 31 days, which was the case with the printed monthly issue.

TAKE A SHORT CUT BY SUE



GRUNCH OPINION

I saw an interesting interview on BBC Breakfast with MP Ed Miliband about the plans for renewable energy.

Mr Miliband was being questioned about local opposition to some of the plans.

His response was interesting saying that opposition will not interfere with the greater plan.

What he means is that if we have made our plans about a particular project then we will not be affected by any opposition. If we think it is a good idea, then we will go full steam ahead.

This interview came a couple of days after the East West Rail consultation event at Wilden.

While discussing the railway with an EWR representative, he came out with an interesting statement.

"This is not a referendum," he said. "We are simply letting people know what is going to happen." What this means is that those attending the consultations are not going to change the decision whether it is as a project as a whole or try and persuade those in power to look again at an alternative route between Bedford and Cambridge.

The decision to go ahead with the project for the entire length between Oxford and Cambridge was confirmed by the Labour government shortly after they were elected.

According to what was said the EWR event at Wilden EWR, it seems they have made the decision without knowing what the total costs will be. Effectively, the green light has been given still without a business plan.

For when asked about the costings, no definitive answer could be given. And it was same when the experts were asked about the plans for constructing the railway.

For example, no one could clarify the diversion route for the A6 when the viaduct is being built over the Paula Radcliffe Way.

FOCUS ON THE VILLAGER BUS

The Villager Bus is run by volunteers for the North Bedfordshire communities. There are scheduled routes each week and it can be hired for outings.

The new bus can take up to 16 passengers including space for one wheelchair user. It has a low floor for easy access and a wheelchair ramp, as well as air conditioning, WiFi and phone charging points.

The Villager Bus provides regular bus services from the North Bedfordshire villages to various destinations, including Olney, Bedford, Milton Keynes, Rushden Lakes and St Ives. Concessionary Bus Passes can be used as well as payment by card or cash. Currently the cost of a single journey to any destination is only £2.

The purchase of the new bus was made possible with the generous support of various sponsors including Bedford Borough Council, the Harpur Trust, The Gale Family Charity Trust, Felmersham and Radwell Community Trust, Wixamtree Trust, The Connolly Foundation and the Christopher H R Reeves Trust.

BEDFORDSHIRE WALKING FESTIVAL

The Bedfordshire Festival of Autumn Walks 2024 ran between 7th and 15th September this year.

It is fair to say that the Festival was a huge success with 55 walks, attracting 850 walkers over the nine days.

What did we do differently this year? The Festival is hosted by the four groups that make up Bedfordshire – North Beds, Leighton Buzzard, Lea & Icknield (Luton) and Ivel Valley Walkers.

It's a huge task managing to source a large number of walks so this year we reached out to other groups and invited them to come and run walks as part of the Festival.

We had a terrific response to our request. We had support from our neighbouring ramblers groups – Wellingborough Ramblers, Hunts Ramblers and Stag Walkers.

In addition to these, we garnered support from local affiliated groups Bedford Rambling Club and Toddington Ramblers together with general walking groups The Northampton Shamblers and U3A.

And of course we should also mention the fantastic well-being walks, which contributed a number of shorter walks. 2024 also saw the return of the Greensand Ridge Challenge, covering 40 miles in two days.

All this meant we were able to offer walks from one mile to 21 miles across the nine days. Absolutely something for everyone.

The Festival tries to reach out to people who may not normally consider walking and this year, we had a large number of interest walks that sparked attendance from far and wide.

The Festival covered Friday 13th and we were delighted to host a Ghost, Murders and Mysteries walk, which attracted 29 walkers.

There was also a bat walk in the evening where the walkers were provided with bat detectors. We spotted four different types of bats and saw a huge number as they



emerged from their roosts to feed around the lake at Harrold and Odell Country Park.

There were short town walks looking at the industrial parts of Leighton Buzzard and the various industries associated with Luton.

One of the benefits of town walking is that it allows accessibility for less mobile members of the public.

Fancy a nosey around a cemetery and see the history that is locked up in the gravestones? The two walks around the Victorian Cemetery in Bedford certainly sparked people's interest.

We are proud that our efforts opened up walking to a wider community.

Our dedicated webpage also attracted groups who contacted us to advertise their walks via this medium and Turvey, a north Bedfordshire village, saw huge interest generated in their historical weekend.

Then there were nature walks too – it's the bird migration season and an early morning walk was offered by Marston Vale to see the birds packing their bags to fly south.

All the above supplemented our usual offering of morning, afternoon and all day walks and covered the whole of the county and showcased the beautiful countryside that we call home.

GRUNCH NEWS

North Bedfordshire MP Richard Fuller recently contacted BT Openreach to question the rollout of broadband connectivity in a number of our North Bedfordshire villages as well as the overall situation in the constituency.

Mr Fuller admits this will inevitably open a can of worms, however he would be interested to hear your actual experiences and whether the reality matches the picture painted by the response he received from Openreach which I have included below:

Thanks again for getting in touch to enquire about the current situation in the villages of Bletsoe, Keysoe, Thurleigh and the North Bedfordshire area as a collective.

We're currently in the process of upgrading our network, moving away from copper, and replacing this with Ultrafast Fibre to the Premises (FTTP), reaching speeds up to 1000Mbps through our commercial delivery plans.

Our FTTP delivery is based on telephone exchange areas. When an exchange is scheduled, we aim to build to as much of that exchange area as we can, considering certain operational conditions, upgrading as many properties as we can.

For each specific village requested, I have checked a couple of central addresses to provide an insight of what the current situation is, while providing this under each of the below headings:

BLETSOE

The good news here is that some constituents of Bletsoe can already access FTTP, as Sharnbrook Exchange, which serves this area and the address I checked, was an announced exchange where we were building our fibre network.

For those constituents who can't currently access FTTP, our build is running to the end of 2026, so it's not to say the area wouldn't be covered in a future phase of our delivery, with our planning teams continuously reviewing and adding further plans as time goes on. This will also apply to the village of Keysoe, below. The constituents who don't currently have access to FTTP can currently access a Fibre to the Cabinet (FTTC) broadband service, and the estimated speed range is 80 Mbps – 60 Mbps. I know the speeds available to using this service aren't ultrafast, but it should be suitable for most online tasks and working from home.

KEYSOE

Similarly to Bletsoe, there's good news in that many of your constituents will already have access to a FTTP connection, as the residents here are fed from Colmworth Exchange, which was also announced for our fibre delivery.

For those not currently able to order a FTTP service, FTTC is available with speeds up to 36 Mbps. With these speeds largely determined by the distance between the fibre cabinet and the property, the broadband signal will get weaker the further it has to travel, will result in longer lines having slower speeds.

THURLEIGH

The village of Thurleigh is slightly different from the two above, but the good news is we do have potential plans to deliver FTTP to Ravensden Exchange, which serves this area, however as you can appreciate, there's a lot of work required and it will take us some time to do, with programmes such as these phased over the coming years. We'll need to carry out more detailed work to deliver FTTP to this area.

I know your constituents here will be keen for a FTTP connection, but for now it's too early to confirm any further detail on what premises will be upgraded or give any sort of firm delivery dates. In the meantime, the constituents of Thurleigh can access a FTTC connection, with their estimated range being 80 Mbps – 68 Mbps.

CONCLUSION

My advice for your constituents who are eager for FTTP, would be to keep an eye on our website, as well as register their interest if they haven't already, using the following link so they can be kept in-the-loop of how things are getting on in their area:
